

## OLT Board of Directors Tackles Strategic Planning

Your OLT board met with moderator Deb Chapman on December 1, spending four productive hours evaluating the role that the Orono Land Trust will take in the next five to twenty years. Deb has a wealth of experience with land trusts and non-profit organizations in Maine. Her job as the "circuit-rider" for the Maine Land Trust Network is to help land trusts meet the challenges of the future in the rapidly changing setting of land use and conservation.

The December 1st session included intense brainstorming around the needs of Orono, Veazie, and the surrounding towns. Working with these ideas and the OLT Mission Statement, participants outlined draft visions, goals, and strategies. The results of this session will be used in future sessions to develop actual action steps to move the OLT into the future. For those who are not familiar with the OLT's Mission Statement it is as follows:

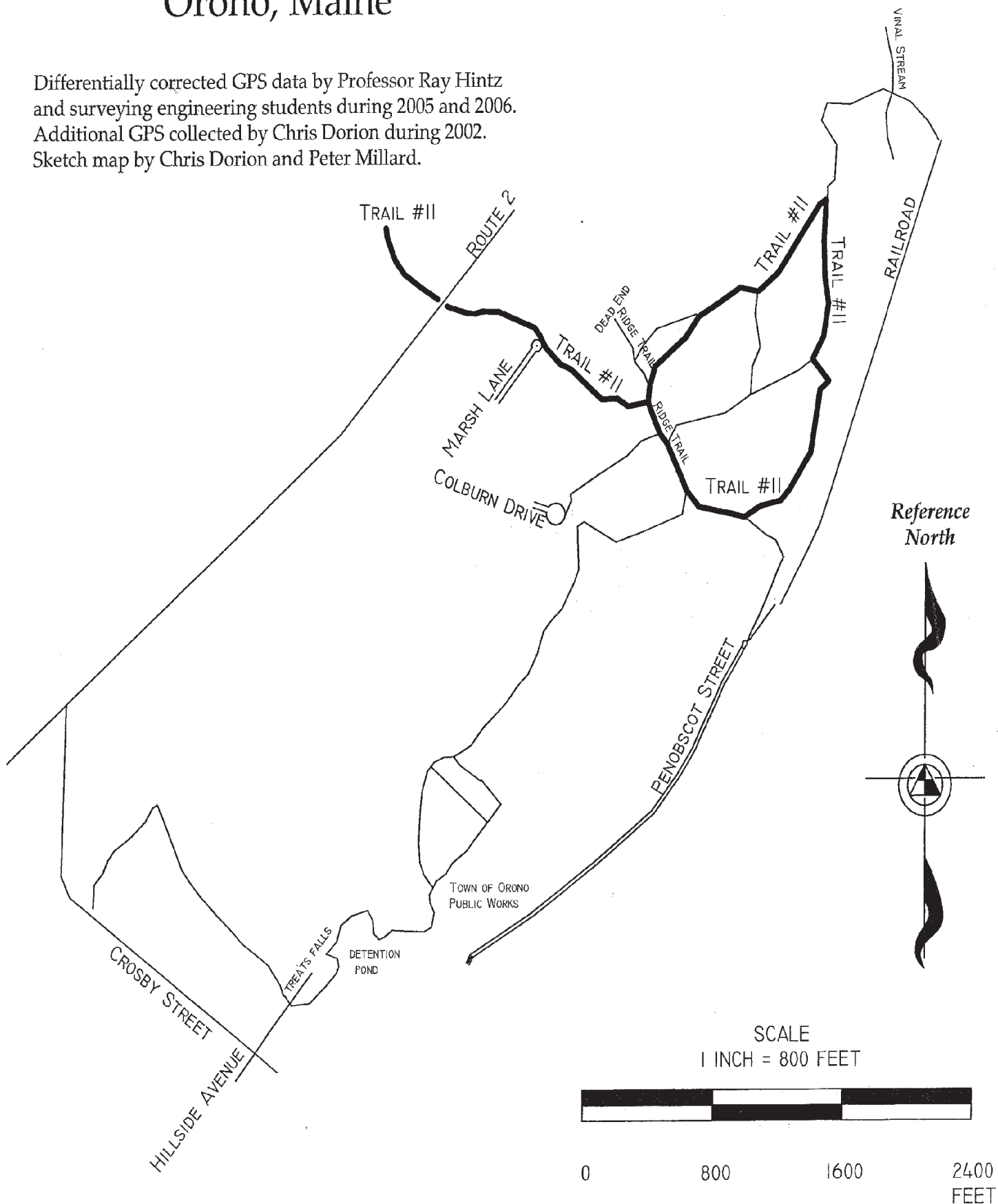

### **Our Vanishing Winter**

Just over 30 years ago I drove with my family into Orono on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July 1976. Within the next two years we were to learn about Maine's "wicked cold wintahs"! The temperatures were brutally low—20 degrees below zero—so low that the snow squeaked when you walked on it. It wasn't enough to have just one nor'easter dump 12-18 inches of snow; it was common to have several storms in succession so that shoveling became a vocation instead of an irregular necessity. In 1978 by mid-winter enough snow had accumulated at the end of my driveway that I had to hire someone with a backhoe to clear it away so that I could see oncoming traffic before I entered Bennoch road. Snow for cross-country skiing and solid ice for skating on the Stillwater River were available most of the winter. Prolonged low temperatures even allowed for creating an adequate ice sheet on the town hockey rink. In 1998 we were reminded of the power of nature and were assailed with a horrific winter ice storm. In contrast, in the most recent 5 years winters have been mostly mild with little snow and with infrequent episodes of sub-freezing temperatures. As the climate continues to warm the ramifications of losing winter are many and they are complex. Effects may be as frivolous as, we can't make a snowman for the lack of snow, to the serious consequences of disruptions of biological cycles and events that affect our food supplies and higher temperatures that allow for an influx of disease-carrying insects from southern climes. The United Nations report on climate change seems to imply that most countries agree that the earth is heating and the cause is mostly from human activities. Because the U.S. produces about one-fourth of the greenhouse gases, isn't it past time for our government to take a responsible position on the issue and to act accordingly?

Members of the Corridor Committee bit off almost more than they could chew when they began writing a proposal to obtain funds under auspices of the North American Wetlands Conservation Act (NAWCA) to further land acquisition for the ambitious conservation effort to preserve a corridor of open space. Late night rewrites, and the talents of many OLT and BLT members and a grant writer were meshed to meet the submission deadline. Our proposal did not receive the technical rating that we expected, partly because our geographic location was not in the priority focus area of the NAWCA board. The proposal was good enough, however, to receive a site visit by two NAWCA reviewers. Our strategy to take the reviews on a helicopter tour of the wetlands and to host a luncheon with our partners greatly improved our chances to be funded. We have been encouraged by the feedback from NAWCA folks, but will not know the final decision on funding until early March. Until then we will continue to complete needed work to be in a position to accept the grant funds should our proposal receive final approval. The process was something like having a root canal done, but we hope it will end with a smile of success.

## Clean-up of Car Parts on Proposed HINDS CE

During the early clean-up day a license plate dated 1962 seemed to confirm that the site was once used as a garage site in the 1960s. Because some parts were too heavy to move, on November 21 Dave Thompson brought his

One of the items unearthed was a large (4 ft. dia.) old Coca-Cola sign that was painted over, in part, with the words “Tony’s Garage”, “Auto Repairs”, “Towing Service”, something not legible, and with “Phone 866-4466” on the bottom of the sign. We were going to take a picture of it for historical documentation but by the time Jim went to his house for a camera and Dave and Jerry returned from the dump road where Dave turned the trailer around, the sign had disappeared! At least the sign confirmed the presence of a garage at the site. This clean-up fulfills the recommendation of the consulting firm that reviewed the parcel for environmental issues. J.R.Longcore
